On April 13, with more than 30 Circuit Clerks in attendance, Governor Steve Beshear recognized Kentucky's achievement of reaching 1 million names on the Kentucky Organ Donor Registry. Governor Beshear said he and first lady Jane Beshear have joined the Kentucky Organ Donor Registry and encouraged all Kentuckians to join as well. "All of us have a wonderful opportunity to make a huge difference by deciding to donate our organs and tissue, after we die, to others who need them. There's no doubt that science and medicine together can work miracles. And we can become a part of those miracles," said Governor Beshear.

As the Governor spoke these passionate words, I listened carefully. However, I couldn't help but watch 6 year old Riley Speck. Riley is an adorable, fun-loving kid. Taking care of his little sister, posing for photos, and talking to his mom and other adults, Riley made everyone in the room smile. Riley is a heart transplant recipient and an amazing reminder of the lives that are saved by organ donation.

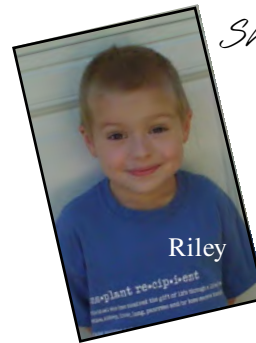

History of the Trust For Life ~ Where it all began...

"I was Circuit Court Clerk of Clark County when I lost a close cousin awaiting a heart transplant. I thought it was a tragedy and decided I'd like to help do something about it. My cousin had a wife and two young boys, and I didn't want anyone else to go through this tragedy. I had seen at the hardware store where a man was accepting \$1 donations for a cause, and it gave me an idea: my fellow Circuit Court Clerks and I can make a difference, so that no one else would lose a loved one waiting for an organ transplant. We got it passed through the Legislature and the Association. The Circuit Clerks and deputies started to ask every person obtaining a driver's license or state ID to donate \$1 to promote organ donation throughout Kentucky."



This was the first program of its kind. Since then, over 30 states have called the Trust to learn how it was done, and how they can begin similar programs in their state offices. Dollar by dollar, the Clerks and willing residents of Kentucky, have raised over \$7 million for this life-saving cause. With the funding, the Trust raises awareness through state-wide advertising and grassroots efforts. The Trust goes into all areas of the Commonwealth to educate Kentuckians about this crucial need.

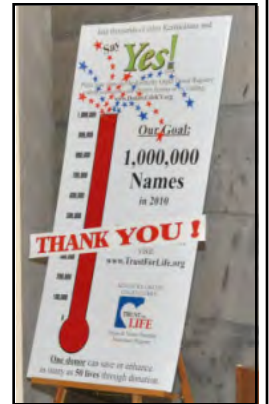

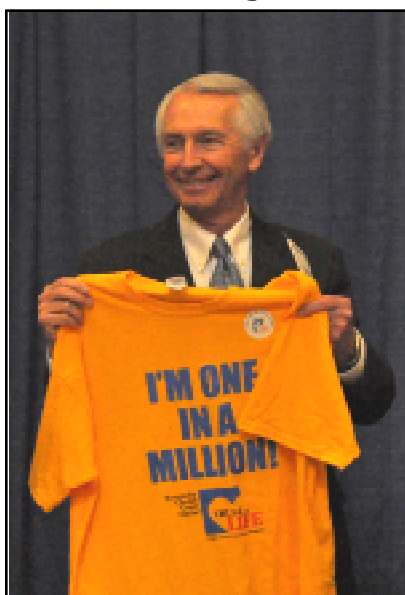

Mucho Macho Man Trainer Turns Spotlight on Organ Donation

By the time this issue of the Update is received, the Kentucky Derby will have been run and a winner determined. However, **Kathy Ritvo**, trainer of Derby contender Mucho Macho Man, was a winner—even before the Derby began. Three years ago, at the age of 39, Kathy received a life-saving heart transplant.

“I had been sick for about 10 years, and it just kept getting worse,” Ritvo said. She was diagnosed with cardiomyopathy, a deterioration of the heart muscle. The same condition had taken the life of her brother at age 38. Medications failed to help and Kathy was placed on the transplant waiting list. “It felt like a lifetime. Sometimes I was afraid to go to sleep for fear I wouldn’t make it through the night,” she said. Ritvo watched the 2008 Derby in her hospital bed, and spent six months in the critical care unit until they received the call that a donor heart was available. “I’m here because somebody unselfishly donated their loved one’s organs. I’m healthy for the first time in a very long time due to this amazing gift,” explains Kathy.



Kathy’s story is a victory—one she’s passionate about sharing. With the esteem of the Kentucky Derby, Kathy is bringing national attention to this lifesaving cause. Throughout her time at Churchill Downs, Kathy has made herself available to every network affiliate and newspaper, including USA Today, to talk about organ donation. She volunteered her time to do a public service ad for the Kentucky Circuit Court Clerks’ Trust For Life encouraging Kentuckians to place their name on the Organ Donor Registry. This commercial is airing throughout Kentucky. David Nicholson, Jefferson Co. Circuit Court Clerk, and Kyleen Kelly from Second Chance @ Life in Louisville, were also interviewed about Kathy and Kentucky’s awareness efforts.

“We need organ donors because it saves lives. My kids have their mother, and my mother has her daughter, and my husband has his wife, because my donor generously gave me a second chance at life,” Ritvo said. Kathy hopes media coverage of her story will boost organ donations and provide hope for others awaiting transplants. “My heart pours out to the people that are waiting. I know they can make it; they just need to hang on,” Ritvo said. We offer a heart felt thank you to Kathy Ritvo for her valuable time and fervent advocacy.

"I've been working at Mercer Circuit Court doing driver's license for a little over 5 years now. As for my art? I'm pretty much self taught. I have always wanted to do art for many years, but really only started trying to get serious with it about 3 years ago. I've done a lot of self study with books and much, much practice. 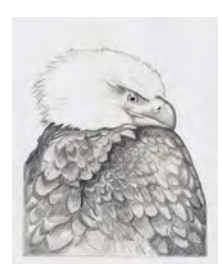
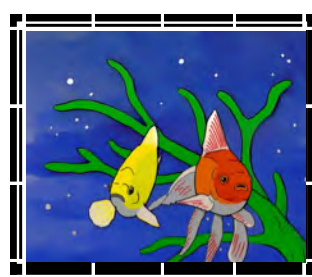
in surrealism.

The colorful cel (which is short for celluloid, the original media for animated works) paintings that I do seem to be the most popular because they are mostly whimsical and quite brightly pigmented.

72 Clerks' Offices to Receive "Thank You" Tins of Popcorn

Tins of gourmet flavored popcorn will be delivered to 72 of the state's drivers license offices as winners in the annual **Trust For Life** April donation percentage contest. To qualify, an office needed to collect the \$1.00 donation from at least 50% of the drivers renewing their license during April, or at least have a 10% increase over the previous month.

This is the eleventh year the Trust has conducted the contest as a way to say "thank you" to the drivers license offices that excelled in collecting the \$1.00 donation that sustains the organ donor awareness program.



A total of 71 offices collected donations from 50% or more of those obtaining drivers licenses or IDs in April. In addition, one office has an increase of over 10%. The statewide average was 43.3%. 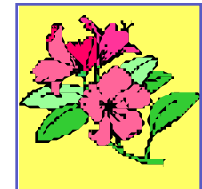
